### Background:

Each USDA agency shall provide an opportunity for Tribes to participate in policy development to the greatest extent practicable and permitted by law. Each Tribe will be provided the opportunity for timely and meaningful government-to-government consultation regarding policy actions which may have tribal implications.



### **PURPOSE**

The Pacific Southwest Region (R5) is engaging in an organizational planning initiative that seeks to align the region's staffing and organizational structure to meet present and future management goals and objectives.

Tribal Relations is an important to the Forest Service because Tribes have indelible ties to the Nation's forests and grasslands.

## TRIBAL RELATIONS STRATEGIC PLAN



### **PURPOSE**

As a part of this alignment, R5 is in the process of drafting a **Tribal Relations Strategic Plan (TRSP)** with the goal of improving how we meet trust responsibilities, respond to tribal rights and interests, and increase collaboration with Tribes.

This Strategic Plan will set program goals and an annual action plan.

### **COMMITTEE**

To begin this task a Preliminary Plan is developed which includes a Program Review Assessment, Tribal Outreach and Engagement, Program of Work, and the preparation of the final Draft TRSP.

The Tribal Relations Program Assessment (TRPA) was developed through a committee consisting of region staff personnel, forest personnel, forest supervisors and tribal members from the region.

### **Protecting Cultural Sites**


An important aspect of the TRSP is protecting tribal cultural sites, traditions, places, and practices. Especially, during Fires.

- Engage at Tribal forums and Inter-tribal organizations




